GENERAL REMINDERS

Just a few reminders for parents:-

- Please stay on the allocated pathways when walking your children on the school site. If you need to cross over, there is a zebra crossing clearly marked out on the car park. Please be aware of staff driving on or off the school site.
- Remember to park considerably outside school when dropping off/collecting children. Please do not block residents drives and especially don't park anywhere it makes it dangerous for children and adults to cross the road, this includes on the yellow lines. You also need to check you have left enough room for an emergency vehicle (ambulance, fire engine etc) to get through.
- Anyone collecting a child by car must **never** park on the zigzag road markings. This is a road traffic offence and you will receive a fine. The zigzags are there to keep children safe. Traffic wardens carry out random spot checks and have issued fines previously.
- It is essential that adults, whilst on and around the school site, are respectful, courteous and model behaviour that we would expect children to follow. The use of bad language and/or aggressive behaviour have no place in our school community. By working together and setting positive examples, we can continue to create an environment where children can succeed. Our children model this consistently every day.

Book publishing company, Penguin Random House UK, has revealed a new book vending machine at Linlithgow Academy, near Edinburgh, Scotland. The machine gives the pupils access to more than seventy different books from Penguin's 'Lit in Colour' reading lists. The reading lists, set up around four years ago, are updated each year and aim to make works by writers of colour more visible and accessible in schools.
