We have had a record number of parents attending parents evenings this week (95%). We are aware that some parents have appointments arranged for after half term. If you didn't manage to speak with teachers this week, you can arrange a mutually convenient time after half term. I would like to thank you for your continued support.

Our headline news for attendance is that we are sitting above national. Published attendance is from children who are in Years 1 - 6. National

attendance is currently 94.8% and Spring Vale attendance is 95.4% putting us 0.6% above the national. We do however have 14.6% (54 pupils) of children that have missed 10% or more of school. After half term we will be working with a number of families who are persistently absent and those who are just above 90% to ensure children come out of this category or don't fall into it. Attendance at Spring Vale is the best in the Lykos Trust. A special mention to our Reception and Nursery classes where attendance is significantly above national expectations for children of these age groups.





We understand that during the winter months, many children will have mild coughs and colds. However, unless your child is feeling seriously unwell, it is important for them to continue attending school if they are well enough to do so.

The office staff are happy to give medicine (during school hours) to children who are well enough to be in school. This includes prescription medicines, over the counter medications and emergency medication. Parents/guardians **must** complete a medicine consent form giving us permission to administer the medication. All medication brought into school **must** be in it's original packaging with clear instructions of dosage and timings. We are not able to accept medication that is not in the original packaging or has been prescribed for someone else. Medication should be handed to and collected from the office staff by an adult at the start and end of each day.





We have received some complaints from residents again about inconsiderate parking. <u>Please park considerately when dropping off/collecting children</u>, <u>do not block residents drives</u> and especially don't park anywhere it makes it dangerous for children and adults to cross the road, this includes on the yellow lines. You also need to check you have left enough room for an emergency vehicle (ambulance, fire engine etc) to get through.

Anyone collecting a child by car must never park on the zigzag road markings. This is a road traffic offence and you will receive a fine. The zigzags are there to keep children safe. I have contacted the Local Authority who will send traffic wardens to carry out random spot checks and they will issue fines.







Red Nose Day is on **Friday 21**<sup>st</sup> **March**. We will let you know the theme for the day after half term. We will also be selling red noses in school from Tuesday  $25^{th}$  February. They will be priced at £2 each.

### In the news this week

The Nepalese government has announced that, from September, climbers aiming for the world's highest mountain will have to pay just over £12,000 (\$15,000) during the main climbing season. This is over \$4,000 more than the previous permit fee for climbing Mount Everest. There have been concerns that there are too many people climbing the mountain, leaving rubbish and not respecting nature. It is hoped the extra money will go towards protecting the area from tourists.
